## Smith's to receive Chamber's ACE award

Doug and Veronica Smith of Dry Creek Farm in Martinsburg are the 2021 recipients of the Blair County Chamber's Agricultural Community Excellence (ACE) Award.

The award was started as a continuation and expansion of the Chamber's successful Farm Family of the Year Award, which was introduced in 1970. It honors not only farm families but agriculturally-oriented individuals, agribusinesses and non-profit organizations that promote agriculture.

"The Smith's fit a number of criteria for the ACE Award," acknowledged Joe Diamond, who chairs the Chamber's Farm-City Committee. "Their outstanding reputation within the dairy industry as well as their community involvement makes them an appropriate choice."

Doug's parents bought the dairy business from his grandparents in 1976. He grew up working on the farm and then formed a partnership with his father

in 1990. Doug and Veronica purchased Dry Creek Farm in 1996 and eleven years later purchased a neighboring farm, adding additional acres to the home farm. The Smith's currently farm 400 acres, growing corn, alfalfa, wheat and hay.

Over the years, the Smith's have grown the dairy business from a 30-cow farm in 1976 to a 250-cow operation today. Expansion has included a flock of 60 sheep being raised at a neighboring farm as well as an ag-bagging business purchased in 2020 featuring a fleet of silage baggers.

Doug and Veronica have served on the PA Farm Bureau Committee. Doug has served on the Bedford Farm Bureau Co-Op Board of Directors for 16 years and currently serves as president. While the Smith's were building a successful business, they were also raising four children on their farm. Today, two of the youngest children as well as a son-in-law are actively involved in the

business. The Smith's also have two grandchildren, Anna and Lucas, who represent the fifth generation to enjoy life on the farm.

"The Smith's absolutely epitomize the definition of a farm family," Diamond admitted. "All their motivations are done with the family in mind. That can be rare today."

The ACE Award is not the only recognition that the Smith's have received. The farm won the 2019 "Dairying for Tomorrow Award For Animal Care," sponsored by the American Dairy Association. The award is consistent with the family's priorities.

"Our family strives to be good stewards of the land and the animals that are entrusted to us," Doug pointed out. "We hope to be a positive influence in our community, a positive place to work for our employees and a business that promotes a sustainable agricultural industry. We consider it an honor to be selected to receive the ACE Award."
